Dear Dr. Nicolaidis:

I would like to make a formal request for the Council of the International Phonetic Association to vote on the adoption of a symbol for the labiodental flap. If it is necessary for a member of the Council to make such a proposal, then Professor Peter Ladefoged (to whom I have sent a copy of this letter) has agreed to formally propose a vote on this matter.

Recent research has shown that the labiodental flap is quite widespread in Africa. It is attested in at least seventy languages and is fully incorporated into the phonological system of at least twenty languages. A standard IPA symbol would be a tremendous benefit for facilitating research on the sound. See Olson & Hajek (1999, 2003, 2004) for detailed discussion of these points.

Concerning a symbol for the sound, I would propose the use of a hooktop v :< v >. This symbol is a roman character that combines a <v> (suggesting a voiced labiodental sound) with a fish $hook \ r < r >$ (suggesting a tap or flap articulation). This symbol was originally suggested to me by Dr. Geoffrey Pullum.
